Parris Island Cos Lettuce

Parris Island Cos



Suitable for transplanting



30cm wide planting space



Germination Period: 5-25 days



Optimum Germination
Temperature: 5-15 degrees

GROW YOUR OWN KAI!

We have included a packet of Parris Island Cos lettuce seeds for you to plant and grow with your whānau!

The planting season for these lettuces is from Early Spring to Early Autumn, so time to get planting tamariki mā! The beginning of the growth of a seed into a seedling is known as Germination, read the information below to learn more about planting this lettuce!

Plant them in a pot and watch them grow! Here are some tips (get your whānau to help you and remember to wash your hands after):

- » lettuce like shade, plant a few seeds in a pot and keep them out of the full sun
- » plant a handful of seeds into a pot (poke a hole in the soil with your finger and pop the seed in). Water and wait for the seeds to sprout. It should take around 10-14 days.
- Once the seeds are sprouted you can move them into your garden to grow bigger. Look out for bugs that will eat your lettuces though!

We can't wait to see what you grow tamariki mā! You'll be amazed at how little seeds turn into huge lettuces and how you can help feed your whānau this way. Send us pictures of your gardens!














This recycling challenge took place over the month of July, and tamariki had 5 challenges to complete using recycling from around their whare.

Tamariki mā we know you loved our challenge month focusing on upcycling and recycling so here is one more challenge for you!





Recommended Supplies:

- » Paper or card
- » Old containers or jars, wooden spoon or cardboard tubes
- » Cut up old shirts, tea towels, tablecloths, or material for their clothes!
- » Old hats
- » You could even use pieces of cut up newspaper as the hair and toilet paper rolls as the arms and legs.

Recycled Money Box

Use items you've recycled from around your whare to make your own Money Box.

Saving your pocket money to buy a treat for yourself can be really rewarding when you've saved for a super long time. What better way to save your hard-earned money than in a money box you designed yourself!

Some ideas:

- » Using old Jars or biscuit tins from around the house are a great idea as the strong metal or glass will keep your money safe (if you save lots of coins, it will get heavy!).
- » Draw some cool pictures on the jar or tin or cut out or print out some of your favorite book or TV characters so you can let everyone know that this is your money box!
- » Use a small box to create something mīharo! Use paint or stickers to give your box that superstar touch so that you never forget which box is yours.
- » If you're using a box or something that doesn't have a lid make sure you cut out a small hole for your money to fit or else you'll have no way to keep your money safe! You can also cut a hole in the bottom of the box too to get your putea out.
- » Put your name on your money box in super big letters to let everyone know that this is your money box!

PICNIC TIME!

Make the most of sunny Spring days and go on a picnic with your whānau and e hoa mā! Here are some kai ideas to make before you go.

FAIRY BREAD



Kā kīnaki | Ingredients

- **Bread**
- **Sprinkles**
- Spreadable Butter (Margarine)



Method

- 1 Get your bread slices (as many as you want) and spread your spreadable butter.
- Cut your bread into triangles.
- With a teaspoon, sprinkle on your sprinkles onto your bread.



Top Tip!

If you love chocolate, use chocolate spread instead of the spreadable butter for that chocolate hit.

RICE BUBBLE SLICE

- Kā kīnaki | Ingredients
- 4 cups of rice bubbles
- Butter
- Honey or golden syrup
- **Brown Sugar**
- Sprinkles or chocolate chips

Method

- Melt the butter, sugar and honey (or golden syrup) in a large pot on the stove (ask a whānau member to help!)
- Keep stirring until it starts to bubble and the sugar has dissolved.
- Turn of the heat, add the rice bubbles and stir until all combined.
- Pour the mixture onto a trav lined with baking paper, spread out until it is the thickness you like.
- Add sprinkles, chocolate chips or anything else you want to add.
- Set in the freezer for 20 minutes or fridge for 1-2 hours.

This slice is easy to make and super tasty – the perfect treat to take on a picnic and share with your whānau and e hoa ma!
